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### **School Board Meetings**

School Board meetings are open to the public and generally held the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month at 3:30 p.m. or 5:30 p.m. in the Board Room of the DeLand Administrative Complex, 200 North Clara Avenue, DeLand. Any meetings held at a different time or place are noted on the district's website at <a href="www.vcsedu.org">www.vcsedu.org</a>. School Board agendas are posted on the district's website 7 days prior to a meeting. The School Board occasionally holds workshops, special sessions, etc. These meetings are noticed and the minutes will be included under "Agendas & Minutes" on the district's website.

Time is allocated on each agenda for public input. If you wish to address the board, please complete a request form located in the back of the Board Room prior to the start of the meeting.

The Volusia County School Board broadcasts its meetings live on the Internet. Visit Volusia County Schools district website or YouTube Channel to watch the meeting live or on-demand.

### **School Entry Requirements and Enrollment**

Welcome to Volusia County Schools! Our goal is to build welcoming, safe and supportive school communities for all students. The following documentation is required to register your student in a Volusia County public school:

### Verification of Legal Name and Guardianship of Student

- Certified birth certificate or passport of student
- Parent/guardian drivers license/identification

### **Verification of Age**

- Certified birth certificate or passport of student
- To enter VPK, a child must be four years old on or before September 1
- To enter kindergarten, a child must be five years old on or before September 1
- To enter first grade, a child must be six years old on or before September 1

### **Verification of Immunizations and Physical Exams**

- Proof of physical examination by a U.S./Florida doctor within 12 months prior to the anticipated first day of school attendance
- Florida Certification of Immunization Form 680

### **Verification of Residency**

Two different proofs of residence/address:

- Category 1: current utility bill, mortgage document, rental or lease agreement
- Category 2: official mail, such as government correspondence, Social Security Administration, recent paycheck/stub, public assistance documents

### **Verification of Academic History**

- Last report card or most recent transcript
- Verification of Special Education Information (if applicable)
- Current Individual Education Plan (IEP) (if applicable)
- Current 504 Plan (if applicable)



### **School Immunization Requirements**

All students entering Volusia County Schools must have current immunizations, unless the student has a medical or religious exemption. Contact your physician or Volusia County Health Department.

Forms to authorize the administration of medication can be found under *Department Resources*.



### Florida Certification of Immunization Form DH 680

Form DH 680, Florida Certification of Immunization is the only document that schools are permitted to accept as proof of immunization. The child's name, date of birth, parent/guardian's name, all the vaccines and dates, and the appropriate section(s) on the reverse side of the form, must be completed. If a child has not had all of the doses required to complete each immunization series, the Temporary Medical Exemption section (Part B) of the DH 680 should be completed by the child's primary care provider.

### Meningococcal Disease

Meningococcal disease is a serious illness caused by bacteria. It is a leading cause of bacterial meningitis in children 2-18 years of age in the United States. Person-to-person transmission occurs with close contact with respiratory secretions or saliva. A dose of MCV4 is recommended for children and adolescents 11-18 years of age. ### **Public Records**

The Florida Public Records Law authorizes the public to inspect, photograph and copy public records maintained by the Volusia County School District. Public records are records made or received in connection with the District's official business. However, there are many statutory exemptions from public records disclosure, and some records are statutorily designated as exempt, confidential or both (student information, social security numbers, health care records, etc.). Exempt and/or confidential records are subject to redaction by the District prior to production. ### Volusia Connect

Volusia Connect, provided by SchoolMessenger, is our school-to-home telephone messaging system which allows the superintendent and school principals to send periodic and personalized messages to all parents and families with one recorded phone call. Parents are encouraged to list current phone numbers on the Emergency Information Card for each student. Only the numbers listed will be used. Messages can also be sent via email.

The one-way text messaging feature requires an effort to make sure cell phone numbers are collected and input properly so they can be uploaded to the automated calling system. Parents may periodically receive a text message and may opt-out if they do not wish to continue receiving messages in this format. There is always the ability to call the school to opt-in or out at any time during the school year.



### **Emergency Information Card**

Be sure to keep your contact information up-to-date in case of emergencies. You will receive an emergency contact card at the beginning of the year. Make sure your information is correct, including phone numbers and e-mail addresses, and return the card to your child's school.

### Let's Work Together to Keep Our Students Safe

Every student has a right to learn in a safe, healthy and supportive environment. In Volusia County, we make the safety and well-being of your student, our employees, and all visitors a top priority. As many of you are aware, state law requires an armed, trained, safe school officer on every school campus during the school day. In compliance with state statute, we have partnered with local law enforcement to ensure all of our school campuses have local police officers, sheriff's deputies or school guardians assigned.

Volusia County Schools is also a part of a statewide initiative called FortifyFL. It's a reporting app that allows anyone to anonymously report a threat involving schools directly to law enforcement and school administrators. ### **Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten**



Voluntary Prekindergarten/Early Learning Initiative is a free program available to children who are four years old on or before September 1 of the current school year. This program teaches children the skills they need for a successful transition into kindergarten. These specialized programs extend the three hours of VPK instruction into a full school day aligned with the K-5 instructional schedule.

Volusia County Schools VPK teachers have one primary goal when planning and preparing our students: kindergarten readiness. Kindergarten readiness is a journey and transition into formal academic instruction. Many skills and capabilities are needed for this transition to be successful. Kindergarten readiness does not mean already knowing kindergarten skills but rather

having a foundation of knowledge and exposure that helps students better prepare for their kindergarten experience.

During this program, the students will be taught the Florida Early Learning and Developmental Standards: Physical Development, Approaches to Learning, Social and Emotional Development, Language and Literacy, Mathematical Thinking, Scientific Inquiry, Social Studies, Creative Expression Through the Arts.

### Extended Day Enrichment Program (EDEP) and Before the Bell

The Extended Day Enrichment Program (EDEP) and Before the Bell (BTB) program provide structured academic enrichment programs for school-age children in grades K-8. Every child and youth should have a safe and supportive environment while engaging in activities that support academic achievement and promote social, emotional and physical development before and after the regular school day. EDEP/BTB Programs are staffed with qualified after school personnel. For more information, contact your child's school.

- EDEP is for students in grades K 5 and is offered at 40 elementary schools
- Before the Bell is for students in grades 6 8 and is offered at 11 middle schools

### **Elementary School—Where Learning Begins...**

The Florida Department of Education has implemented Florida Standards in Language Arts (LAFS) and Mathematics (MAFS) and the Next Generation Sunshine State Standards (NGSSS) for science and social studies. These standards provide learning goals for students in every grade. Under the standards your child will be learning from kindergarten through 5<sup>th</sup> grade to read and respond to what they have read; build foundations in vocabulary and content for Physical, Earth, Space and Life sciences; be fluent in mathematics; and study the traditions, history and geography of Florida, the United States and other countries. ### The "Middle School" Years

### Meeting the Needs of our Middle School Students

Between the ages of 10 and 14, children can experience dramatic physical changes and these years are often characterized by mood swings and feelings of insecurity. Middle school children's behavior can vary from mature to immature and they may feel confused and perplexed by their rapidly changing bodies. Often during middle school years, our children's friends become more essential to them. While they continue to value the adults in their lives, they often seek approval from their peers.

In order to meet these dramatic changes, middle schools in Volusia County strive to address the social-emotional needs of our students as well as their academic needs as they transition from childhood to adolescence. In addition to rigorous academic programs and opportunities for students to receive academic intervention and academic acceleration, students receive embedded instruction and guidance regarding social emotional learning that is vital as they navigate these



challenging years. Parent involvement in their child's middle school years is essential and we strongly encourage parents to utilize the various resources available at your school to support your child's transition and strengthen our home to school connection.

### Middle School and the Florida Standards

The curriculum for middle-schoolers is rigorous and aligns with the Florida State Standards, and Next Generation Sunshine State Standards (NGSSS) (where applicable). Each academic course has its own unique curriculum map that highlights this alignment and provides teachers and students with a pathway toward mastery of the required standards throughout the school year. Required state testing for middle school includes: Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) testing for English language arts and mathematics (grades 6-8), NGSSS testing for science (grade 8) and end of course (EOC) testing for civics (Grade 7) and applicable high school level courses.

Our middle schools are designed to provide and create challenging academic opportunities for our students. Multiple high school level courses are available for students to accelerate their learning and earn high school credits. In addition, career exploration and a variety of career academies are available in our middle schools. We encourage parents to reach out to their assigned middle school to learn more about the academies and programs offered at their child's school.

### Middle School Promotion Criteria

In order to be promoted to the next grade level within a middle school, a student must make acceptable progress in at least five of the seven courses they are enrolled in during the school year. This must also include satisfactory completion of at least three of the four core courses: English, mathematics, science and social studies. In order to be promoted to grade 9, middle school students must have successfully completed three courses in English, three courses in mathematics, three courses in science, and three courses in social studies (one of which must be civics).

### **Exploring Opportunities in High School**

All public high school programs meet or exceed state requirements. Extensive offerings are available in language arts, mathematics, social studies, science, music, dance, theatre, art, world languages, career and technical education, and physical education. High schools also have specialized credit retrieval labs, which provide an opportunity for high school students to retrieve failed credits through a competency-based, online curriculum and remain on track for graduation. Specific courses, including elective offerings, vary between schools based on student demand, community needs, and staff availability.

### High School Students and the Florida Standards

The curriculum for high school students represents high standards and high expectations. Each subject taught has its own curriculum map — a living



document that demonstrates the alignment between Volusia County's curriculum and the Florida Standards (as well as Florida's Next Generation Sunshine State Standards where applicable). The curriculum maps confirm what students should know and be able to do by the time they graduate high school.

Special academic programs include **Advanced Placement (AP)** at all high schools, which offers students the opportunity to take college level courses while still in high school. Many colleges give credit and/or advanced college standing to students who attain an acceptable score of three or above (5-point scale) on an AP examination.

The International Baccalaureate (IB) program is offered at DeLand and Spruce Creek high schools and necessitates a specific entrance requirement. This program is designed for students seeking admission to competitive four-year, postsecondary institutions. Students must take a sequenced curriculum and

participate in exit exams, which could qualify the student for college credit or advanced standing.

The Cambridge International/AICE program is offered at Deltona, New Smyrna Beach, Pine Ridge, Seabreeze and University high schools and necessitates a specific entrance requirement. This program is designed for students seeking admission to competitive four-year, post-secondary institutions. Students must take a sequenced curriculum and participate in exit exams, which could qualify the students for college credit or advanced standing.

**Dual Enrollment** allows students to attend college classes to receive credit both at the high school level and at the college level. While not for every student, the dual enrollment program is designed to meet the needs of the academically motivated, socially mature student.

**AVID** is an academic program that promotes a track to college and provides students the motivation, support and the success plan to get into college after high school. AVID is designed for students who are motivated but may need a little extra support in the classroom to be academically challenged. In AVID, students are placed into courses that will make them college ready, with additional support in the form of AVID tutorials and college tutors available to assist them during the AVID elective.

### **High School Graduation Requirements and Options**

### **Graduation Requirements**

Graduation from a Volusia County high school is determined by the number of credits earned. In addition to taking the required coursework to graduate, a student must:

- Have earned a cumulative grade point average of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale; and
- Have passed all the applicable testing requirements

### **Diploma Options**

- 24-credit standard diploma
- 18-credit Academically Challenging Curriculum to Enhance Learning (ACCEL)
- 18-credit CTE diploma
- Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) curriculum
- International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma curriculum

### **Diploma Designations**

In addition to meeting the standard 24-credit diploma requirements, a student may earn one or more designations on their diploma:

- Scholar Designation
- Merit Designation
- Florida Seal of Biliteracy

### eLearning Labs/Virtual Learning Labs

This program serves students who may benefit from a setting that is an alternative to the traditional school day. Students and their teacher(s) will be in a blended learning environment. This means that a bulk of the students' coursework is done in a virtual setting while the teacher provides support in setting daily, weekly, and monthly academic goals for successful completion of required courses. The teacher is trained in working one-on-one with students to support their individualized learning path. Goal setting helps set cooperative pacing and encourages students to master skills as they move on to more difficult materials until they complete the requirements for each course. These centers offer individualized, self-paced online learning for students wanting to earn credits at their maximum pace while moving toward graduation.

The eLearning program offers a unique opportunity to students at each of the 10 high schools. Students should inquire with their zoned school counselor for enrollment consideration. When requirements for graduation are met, **students will receive a diploma from their zoned high school.** 



### What is Career & Technical Education?

Today's cutting edge, rigorous and relevant career and technical education (CTE) prepares students for a wide range of high skill, high wage, high demand careers in specialized fields such as healthcare, finance, information technology and the trades. Through CTE courses students gain pathway specific **TECHNICAL**, **ACADEMIC** and cutting-edge **EMPLOYABILITY** skills for success in any workplace, in further education and in career awareness and planning.

Volusia County Schools offers 61 career and technical education programs and 42 career academies at the high school level.

- CTE programs consist of three or more job preparatory courses that culminate in an opportunity to earn industry certifications
  or digital tools certificates in a career area of interest.
- Career academies are small learning communities that combine rigorous TECHNICAL CTE coursework and college-prep
   ACADEMIC coursework with a career focus.

### **Real-World Experiences**

Developing a productive and adaptable workforce that is competitive in the global economy is key to American excellence and prosperity. An important way CTE programs achieve this goal is by ensuring that education and business work together to equip students with the skills vital to success in the workplace.

Through business partnerships, students participate in career cluster targeted work based learning experiences that enable

them to apply the knowledge gained in CTE programs through the following opportunities:

- Internships
- Job Shadowing
- On-the-Job Training (OJT)
- PreApprenticeships
- Mentoring
- Field Studies
- School Based Enterprises

Students participating in Career Technical Student Organizations (CTSOs) interact with business professionals to practice critical EMPLOYABILITY skills through local, state and national competitions and events.

High school students involved in CTE are more engaged, perform better and graduate at higher rates.

### **Digital Tools & Industry Certifications**

### **Digital Tools Certificates (Grades 6-8)**

Digital Tools exams are offered to our middle school students to support the development of digital skills in areas such as word processing, coding, presentations and digital citizenship.

### **Industry Certifications (Grades 9-12)**

Students who earn an industry certification have demonstrated evidence of mastery in a **TECHNICAL** skill. Research indicates that students who attain industry certifications will earn more over the course of their career than those that are lacking these recognized industry certifications. Industry certifications count toward acceleration as a component of school grade.

### **Articulated College Credit**

The State Board of Education has approved over 140 certifications that will earn students college credit.

### **Online Credit**

Students who earn a nationally recognized industry certification in the Information Technology cluster satisfy the online course graduation requirement.

### Help Stop Bullying


Bullying is a widespread and serious problem that can happen anywhere. It is not a phase children have to go through, it is not "just messing around," and it is not something to grow out of. Bullying can cause serious and lasting harm.

Although definitions of bullying vary, most agree that bullying involves: 1) imbalance of power — people who bully use their power to control or harm others, and the people being bullied may have a hard time defending themselves; 2) intent to cause harm — bullying is not an accident, the person bullying has a goal to cause harm; and 3) repetition — incidents of bullying often happen to the same person over and over by the same person or group. Bullying can take many forms. Examples include: verbal — name calling, teasing; social — spreading rumors, excluding people intentionally or breaking up friendships; physical — hitting, punching, shoving; or cyberbullying — using the Internet, mobile phones or other digital technologies to harm others. To report a possible incident of bullying, immediately talk to your school's administration.

### Your Rights as a Parent

There are times when you may need to be an advocate for your child at school. You may need to speak up when you see that your child's needs are not being met. Getting to know your child's school and teacher is the first step in being a good advocate. According to the

Florida Department of Education, you have the right to:



- Be a part of developing an individual educational plan to meet your child's needs if your child is in a special education program.
- Request parent-teacher conferences during the school year. Write down your questions and concerns before the meeting. Remember you are in a position to share important information as well as ask questions.
- Ask for a review of the decision if your child is suspended from school.

### Volusia County Schools' chain of support



We are committed to holding student information secure — so all accounts must be verified with a PIN. This PIN is provided by the student's enrolled school and is required to establish a Parent Portal account. ### English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL)

English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) is a program that provides instruction to improve the English language proficiency of English language learners (ELLs). ESOL instruction integrates instructional techniques for teaching English as a Second Language in accordance with the curriculum standards requirements. The

curriculum provides an equal amount of instruction, scope and sequence as that of the general education students.

The students considered for these classes function at different levels of English, come from diverse backgrounds, and speak various native languages. Teachers facilitate instruction using English language development standards (ELDS), ESOL strategies and accommodations to help them meet their instructional needs in a comprehensible manner.

### Translation/Interpretation

The ESOL Department provides translation and interpretation services for limited English proficient families. An interpreter can be provided for teacher conferences, ESOL/ESE meetings, etc. This service is to help parents become more involved in their children's education.

### Florida Seal of Biliteracy

Students will have the opportunity to earn the **Florida Seal of Biliteracy**. This graduation distinction is earned with 4 years of a world language with a 3.0 average or the required score on an approved assessment. Eligible students must also earn the required ELA FSA score. The Seal of Biliteracy is intended to identify students with 21<sup>st</sup> century global and linguistic competency for prospective employers and college admissions. It is also intended to honor the multiple cultures and languages in a community.

### **Parent Leadership Council**

The Parent Leadership Council is established at the district level (PLC). During these PLC meetings parents, teachers, school staff and community groups are provided training opportunities and information. The goal of our Parent Leadership Council is to empower parents to become active participants in their child's education and enhance the district to school communication.

### **World Languages**

A 21st century education includes the study of world languages and cultures. Every opportunity for language acquisition offers our students unique advantages for personal growth and future professional success. The study of a second (or third, or fourth) language enhances the student's ability to master critical learning skills necessary for academic success.

### **Successful Parent-Teacher Conferences**

One of the best ways to find out how your child is doing in school is through a parent-teacher conference. The following tips will ensure a successful result for your child.

### Before the Conference Tips for Parents:

- Teachers are contracted to be in school during school hours and for a short period of time before and after school. You will need to arrange to come to school during that time for the conference.
- Teachers must have 24 hours notice before a parent-teacher conference is scheduled.
- If you anticipate language differences, ask for an interpreter. The conference can be scheduled for a time when the interpreter can be present.
- Find out how your child feels about school (ask what he or she likes best or least and why).
- Prepare questions or concerns you wish to discuss.
- Everyone's time is valuable. Please be sure to be on time.

### **During the Conference Tips for Parents:**

- Parent-teacher conference may bring up all kinds of feelings. REMEMBER: the conference is an opportunity to work with the teacher as a team.
- Since conference time is limited stay focused on the topic.
- Share observations from home about your child's strengths and weaknesses.
- Share relevant medical information concerning your child's general health, allergies, vision problems, etc.
- Share any relevant changes in the family situation.
- Listen carefully and ask the teacher to explain any terms or concepts you don't understand.
- Ask for more information or examples/samples of student work or behaviors that are relevant to the topic of the conference.
- If the teacher points out areas where your child needs to improve, ask for a plan to help your child make the improvements and ask how you can help.
- Be sure to sign and ask for a copy of the Record of Conference Form.
- If necessary, make an appointment for a follow-up phone conversation or conference.
- If you feel uncomfortable with the manner in which the conference is progressing, politely stop the conference and request the presence of an administrator.

### After the Conference Tips for Parents:

- Follow through on suggestions made during the conference.
- Continue the open lines of communication throughout the year.

### **Choice Programs**

Educational choice is the practice of allowing all families to make meaningful decisions about how and where their children will receive a primary and secondary education from a variety of schools and programs. In Volusia County, options may include, but not be limited to, charter schools, alternative schools, advanced programs, dual enrollment, home school, virtual school and career academies.

### **Choice for Capacity**

Each Volusia County school is considered a school of choice and will be designated with one of the following classifications: substantial capacity, limited capacity, or at or over capacity. Available school capacity is the primary determining factor for approvals of choice applications. The classification of each school is based on projected student enrollments.

A Career Academy is a small learning community that combines a college-preparatory curriculum with a career focus. Teacher teams, in conjunction with business partners, provide the real-world skills necessary for students to be successful in today's work environment. ### High School Showcase

The Annual High School Showcase is scheduled for December 10, 5:30-7:30 p.m., at the Volusia County Fairgrounds. The showcase offers students and their families an opportunity to explore all high schools and their academic programs, as well as other opportunities that are available at the high school level.

Requirements and procedures for enrolling at schools other than the zoned school are available as well. Families can also contact individual schools to learn about specific program offerings and requirements.

Selecting the opportunities that are right for the student is an important key to high school success.

### **Online Learning Options**

### Volusia Online Learning Full-Time Instruction

Students who choose to be a full-time online learning student take all of their classes from home rather than the traditional brick and mortar school while residing in Volusia County. The district offers its students a full-time virtual program option for grades K-12 through Volusia Online Learning and our partnership with two online providers. Students may apply for full-time virtual instruction during the enrollment period. Once admitted, students may receive the use of a computer and assistance toward Internet access if there is none available in the home AND the student qualifies for free/reduced lunch program.



### **Volusia Online Learning Part-Time Instruction**

Offered to students in grades K-12, virtual courses are included in the student's daily course schedule either during or beyond the school day. Students should apply for courses at <a href="www.volusiaonlinelearning.com">www.volusiaonlinelearning.com</a>. Courses will begin in August and end in May (following the school district calendar) with open, rolling enrollment throughout the school year to accommodate transfer students. Part-time virtual courses fulfill the online course graduation requirement.

Online Course Graduation Requirement. For all students, beginning with the class of 2015, at least one course required for graduation must be completed through online learning, as per Section 1003.428, F.S. A semester course will fulfill this requirement (.5 credit) but NOT half of a full-year (1.0 credit) course. An online course taken for high school credit during grades 6 through 8 fulfills this requirement. Special note: This requirement does not apply to a student who has an individual educational plan which indicates that an online course would be inappropriate or to a student who is newly enrolled in a Florida high school with less than one academic year remaining until graduation.

**Academically Challenging Curriculum to Enhance Learning** (ACCEL) in support of grade and/or course acceleration. Students and their parents should consult their school counselor for more information and criteria to access these options.

**Teenage Parent Program** is provided for male and female, pregnant and parenting students and their children. The district-facilitated program provides services for eligible students who wish to remain in school with aspirations for graduation. Eligible students take an online parenting course and receive free childcare at any licensed daycare of their choice.

### **Everybody Every Day—Attendance Matters!**

- Volusia County Schools' focus is on reducing <u>chronic absenteeism</u>, which is defined as missing 10 percent of school days for any reason, whether excused or unexcused absences, including out-of-school suspensions.
- Research shows that chronic absenteeism is a primary cause of <u>low academic</u> <u>achievement</u> and a powerful predictor that students will eventually <u>drop out</u> of school.
- Poor attendance in the first month of school can predict chronic absence for the entire year.



- Absenteeism in...
  - ...preschool and kindergarten can influence whether a child will be held back in third grade.
  - ...kindergarten can affect whether a child develops the grit and perseverance needed to succeed in school.
  - ...middle and high school can predict dropout rates.
- Absenteeism influences not just chances for graduating but also for completing college.
- Students who are exhibiting a pattern of non-attendance must be referred to the Child Study Team for assistance with the remediation of the problem. A meeting with the parent must be scheduled to identify potential remedies.



- <u>Early intervention</u> in school attendance is the most effective way of producing good attendance habits that will lead to improved student learning and achievement.
- Refer to the district's <u>Student Attendance Policy 206</u> for attendance procedures.

### FSA (Florida Standards Assessment)

The Florida Standards Assessment is a test given to Florida students to measure what they know and are able to accomplish in reading, writing, and mathematics. The Florida Standards are broad statements that describe what a child should know and be able to do at every grade level. Students in grades 5 and 8 will still continue to take the Statewide Science Assessment.

The Florida Standards is part of Florida's plan to improve student achievement. It helps ensure that children in Florida will receive an education that will prepare them to meet the challenges of a changing world and workplace. All public school students in grades 3-10 are required to take the FSA.

### Achievement Levels

Achievement levels describe the success a student has achieved on the Florida Standards tested on the FSA. Achievement levels range from 1 to 5, with Level 1 being the lowest and Level 5 being the highest.

### **Testing Tips**

- Show your child you are supportive
- Discuss materials sent home with your child
- Ensure your child gets a good night's sleep
- Make sure your child eats a good breakfast
- Have your child at school on time



### **Academic Proficiency and Promotion Requirements**

Report cards are provided at regular intervals to keep parents fully informed of their child's academic proficiency. If your child has not demonstrated mastery/proficiency (grade C or better) in a reading, language arts, mathematics, or science course, he/she is not meeting minimum state and district expectations. Promotion is based on how well students are performing according to the Florida Standards. The Volusia County School Board has established criteria for student progression, which includes state and district requirements. ### **Student Services**

The Student Services department provides a wide array of assistance programs, specialized services, and comprehensive services to students, staff, and parents. The Student Services department includes school counseling services, school social services, school psychological services, positive behavior support and health services.

**School Counselors** incorporate prevention and intervention with continuous academic, college & career, and social & emotional development activities that will prepare students for meaningful participation in a diverse, changing world. They also provide resources to students, staff, families and others to establish a safe school climate necessary for academic and social & emotional growth.

**School Social Workers** serve as a vital link between the home, school and community in order to help students increase academic and social/emotional success. School Social Workers are professionally trained in social work and counseling. Their skills and expertise enable them to deal with the multiple needs of students. They work with students both individually and in group settings, make home visits, collaborate with school staff and community agencies, monitor school attendance, conduct social and developmental assessments, and provide information and referral services in order to help meet the needs of students and families.

School Psychological Services provides ongoing consultative services with teachers, parents and students regarding school related issues, providing healthy and effective alternatives to address learning and behavioral difficulties. School psychologists assist teachers and problem-solving teams in developing classroom intervention strategies for students whose learning skills and abilities or social/emotional adjustment interferes with their educational progress. In addition, school psychologists are professionals with specialized training in both psychology and education who assess the intellectual, academic, behavioral, and emotional strengths and weaknesses of students. Parents may contact the Coordinator of School Psychological Services by calling (386) 734-7190, ext. 20757.

**School-wide Positive Behavior Intervention & Support** (PBIS) teams, as part of the Volusia County Behavioral Initiative (VCBI), work to improve school climate by inspiring a safe and civil learning environment for all students and adults. Members of the Student Services department, working collaboratively with school-based PBIS teams, assist with reviewing current practices, identifying school climate strengths and areas of concern, and problem-solving to develop a customized plan for maintaining a positive and proactive behavioral approach designed to teach social and personal competencies.

**School Health Services** are provided to students in grades Pre-K through 12. These services are considered to be both preventative as well as treatment directed. School nurses and health aides address the needs of students who enter the clinic with an assortment of health issues. Services provided are intended to supplement, rather than replace, parental responsibility. School nurses and health aides encourage parents to monitor their child's health and the use of physicians, dentists and community health agency services. It is expected that children who receive services through the school health program will have fewer visits to physicians and emergency rooms, fewer days lost from school due to illness, and will receive daily monitoring for chronic health conditions.

### Parent-Teacher Support Groups

PTA (Parent Teacher Association) and PTSA (Parent Teacher Student Association) make up the largest volunteer child advocacy organization in the United States. A not-for-profit association of parents, educators, students, and community members, the PTA encourages parental and public involvement in public schools. PTA provides members with parent education, leadership training, and a powerful voice of advocacy on behalf of all children. PTO (Parent Teacher Organization) is an independent group which also supports children and educational issues.

### **Volunteers in Public Schools**

Studies have shown that children whose parents are involved at school have a greater self-esteem, a more positive attitude toward school, improved performance and better behavior. School volunteer programs benefit all participants. Parent volunteers have a greater understanding of the educational process while receiving direct satisfaction of helping children succeed. School staff receive a helping hand, while the community reaps the reward of millions of dollars of work provided free.

Volunteer opportunities are everywhere, from helping in classrooms/special areas, chaperoning on field trips, tutoring/mentoring, to holding leadership positions in parent organizations/advisory councils. Chaperoning on overnight trips and/or serving as a band adjunct requires fingerprinting. To volunteer, fill out an online volunteer application and have your government issued ID with photograph scanned into our Raptor Visitor Management System. Once approved, your application will be valid for one school year, through June 30. For more information contact your school's volunteer coordinator or the Volunteer/Partnership Programs Department at ext. 38379 or ext. 38381.

### School Advisory Council (SAC)

Each school annually develops a School Improvement Plan (SIP) through their School Advisory Council. This advisory group is made up of school staff, community members, parents, business partners and students. Members provide direction to improve student achievement, such as:

- Prioritizing the needs of the school
- Developing strategies for improving the areas of need
- Developing a plan for measuring the results of the SIP
- Assisting in the preparation and evaluation of the SIP
- Assisting in the preparation of the school's annual budget
- Deciding how to spend the SAC funds to meet the SIP goals

**Strategies to Deal** 

### **Exceptional Student Education (ESE)**



When students struggle academically or behaviorally or have other barriers to learning, strategies and interventions are put in place to address student needs. When it appears that a student's needs cannot be met with general education interventions, a student may be referred for evaluation for possible Exceptional Student Education (ESE) consideration.

Both students with disabilities and students identified as gifted receive services and supports through the district's Exceptional Student Education (ESE) department. Students with disabilities have an Individual Education Plan (IEP) developed to meet their unique educational needs. Students who meet gifted eligibility criteria have an Educational Plan (EP).

For most students with IEPs, efforts are made to serve students in their neighborhood zone school when possible. Certain programs may require students to attend a different school which offers the program. This is typically true for students in low incidence programs, including the district's gifted program.

For students with IEPs, the district is committed to ensuring that students are served in the Least Restrictive Environment (LRE) to meet their educational needs, as this is a foundational principle of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). For example, a student with a mild learning disability may be able to have their IEP addressed in a general education classroom as opposed to a more

restrictive setting. As a result, student progress is reviewed regularly to ensure that LRE for each student is being addressed.

School districts are also required to meet the needs of preschool children (ages 3-5) who have been identified with a disability. The identification of children with disabilities and the development of a service plan is done through the district's Child Find office. If you suspect your child has a developmental delay or disability and would like a screening, contact the Child Find office at (386)734-7190, ext. 52841.

Parents/guardians of K-12 students suspecting that their child may have a disability are encouraged to contact the chair of the Problem Solving Team (PST) at their child's school. This team of educational professionals will help identify interventions and supports for a student to be successful (i.e., in general education or ESE if eligible). Parents/guardians of students who are already identified as a student with a disability or giftedness may contact your child's ESE teacher(s) for assistance. Since family support is so critical to student success, Volusia County Schools encourage all families to attend a Title I orientation meeting, offered at the student's school, to learn about the program and the role of parents in the success of their child's education. Parents are encouraged to become involved in the education of their children at home and school. With input from families, every school that receives Title I funds must develop an annual Parent & Family Engagement Plan (PFEP). This plan outlines how the school will help families support their children's academic success, increase family engagement in school related activities, and foster communication between the home and school. Research reveals that high student achievement, positive attitudes, and better behavior are closely related to positive family engagement in education.

### School - Parent - Student Compact

Each Title I School, in conjunction with parents, develops a School – Parent – Student Compact. A compact outlines how parents, school staff and students will share the responsibility for improved student academic achievement. Through the compact, schools and families form a partnership to help children achieve the state's highest standards.

### What Parents Can Do to Help Children Thrive at School

As a parent or caregiver, you have a key role in your child's education—you can help bridge your child's transition from home to school, and give him or her the best chance at success in learning and in life. Here are some ways teachers suggest parents can help support their child's success in school:

- Set high expectations for your child.
- Make sure your child is in school every day and on time. Attendance matters!
- Work collaboratively with your child's teachers and talk to them about goals and expectations for your child.
- Talk to your child each day about what he or she is doing in school and discuss what he or she learned.
- Encourage your child to complete assignments, and see that she or he finishes them.
- Attend parent-teacher conferences.
- Participate in family engagement and volunteer opportunities.

Established in 1985, FUTURES Foundation for Volusia County Schools is a non-profit 501(c)(3) direct support organization which assists in providing programs for students, teachers and staff within our Volusia County School District. FUTURES Foundation's mission is to engage business and civic leaders to promote and achieve educational excellence for the Volusia County School District. Its vision is that all Volusia County Public School students are equipped and prepared for college or career success. FUTURES Foundation provides a variety of recognition, leadership development and scholarship programs impacting students, teachers and staff.

For the 2019-20 school year, FUTURES Foundation funded more than \$102,000 in School District Education Foundation State Matching grants to provide both enrichment and remedial activities for students in 14 schools. These state funded matching grant programs focused on literacy and low performing students and had a direct impact on student test scores and classroom performance. Over the years, FUTURES Foundation has funded almost \$1.9 million in creative, innovative teacher classroom mini-grants for specialized projects created and designed by Volusia County teachers. The foundation's Teacher Mini-Grant Program uses an on-line grant system at <a href="https://www.FindltFundltFloridacom/Volusia">www.FindltFundltFloridacom/Volusia</a> for teachers to apply for

and promote their project's funding needs. Check out this website in October for this school year's creative ideas which need funding.

Through its Take Stock in Children Program, FUTURES Foundation provides college tuition scholarships and mentors for selected financially eligible high school students. Take Stock in Children scholars receive a college tuition scholarship upon completion of the program's requirements which include achieving a cumulative 2.5 GPA upon graduation, remaining drug, alcohol, crime and gang free, and meeting with a mentor weekly for 30 minutes on campus during their high school years.

Other FUTURES Foundation programs include Tomorrow's Leaders, a leadership development program for high school juniors; Turn Around Recognition Program for middle and high school students; First Year Teacher Awards; Principal of the Year Awards; Superintendent's Outstanding Achievement Awards; and the Teacher of the Year Program.
