

- EVERYONE needs to complete the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) in order to be eligible for the Bright Futures Scholarship
- Application opens on October 1, 2022
- Needs to be completed BEFORE graduation- aim to complete by Jan. 1st
- http://www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org/
  - Click on "State Grants, Scholarships, & Applications" and then "Create a Student Account"
- Keep record of Log-in information so can check status on website later
- Asks for the college you plan to attend- if this changes after you apply to BF, you need to update on your application

- EVERYONE needs to have 100 hours of community service documented and turned in
  - Get them in before Winter Break!

 If you have NOT earned your AICE diploma yet, below is the traditional way to qualify for Bright Futures. Plan on meeting these requirements as a back-up (you will not know if earned AICE Diploma until August 2023)

- Can only use BF money at Florida schools
- FAS- 100% tuition at a FL Public University- what you get with AICE diploma
- FMS- around 75% tuition at a FL Public University
- For Private FL schools, you get a portion of tuition paid. Chart with \$\$ breakdown:

# Free Application for Federal Student Financial Aid (FAFSA)

- Overview- what is FAFSA?

- Simple terms- the form you complete to see if you qualify for any financial help from the Government to help pay for college
- Collects personal and financial information from both you and parent(s) and calculates your EFC (Expected Family Contribution)- this number is used to determine how much \$ you qualify for
  - The smaller your EFC, the more \$ you generally qualify for
- Can offer Grants/Scholarships (free money), Loans (pay back), Work-study program



- Everyone is encouraged to complete a FAFSA
- https://fafsa.gov
- Opens October 1, 2022
- FREE to apply
- Best to apply early
- Write down username and password in a safe place!



- Steps to completing the FAFSA

- What to have on hand:
  - Student and Parent SSN
  - Student Driver's License number
  - Student Alien registration number (if not USA citizen)
  - Federal Tax Returns for student and parent(s)
  - Records of any untaxed income (ex-retirement withdrawals)
  - Other financial information (ex-savings, investments)

#### **FAFSA**

- Apply for FSA ID for both YOU and PARENT- can do this ahead of time
  - https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa
- Can ask questions through FAFSA website at any time- use the CHAT feature- they are the Experts
- Can list up to 10 schools applying to
- Check with each school for their deadline to submit FAFSA
  - Ex- FSU recommends FAFSA completed by Dec. 1

#### 3 Things:

- -Application
- -Transcript
- -Test Scores

- Be ORGANIZED- create a <u>chart/spreadsheet</u> for yourself with information about each college applying to
- List Deadlines
  - When is application due?
  - When are SAT/ACT scores due?
  - When are transcripts/SSAR's due?
- Example- UF
  - Application Deadline- Nov. 1
  - SSAR Deadline- Nov. 15
  - Test Score Deadline- Dec. 1

- What application Platform does each school use?
  - Institutional application- on school's website (ex-FIU, FAMU)
  - \*\*\*Common App- <a href="https://www.commonapp.org/">https://www.commonapp.org/</a>
- If numerous schools use one particular platform, it is beneficial and will save time to use that platform

**CHART** 

- What Admissions option should I choose? Some schools give an option- 4 most used:
  - Regular Decision
    - Most common option and sometimes the only option
    - Application Due on a specific date and get Decision on a specific date (Ex-UF-Nov.1, Feb.25)
    - Non-binding
  - Early Decision (some private schools offer this option- example- Flagler College)
    - Binding decision
    - Can only apply ED to one school
    - If you get accepted, you MUST attend this school and withdraw other college applications
    - Only use if you are absolutely CERTAIN that want to go to a particular school
    - Earlier application deadline and earlier notification date
  - Early Action (some private schools offer this option- example- University of Miami)
    - Non-binding
    - Shows a school that you are very interested in them
    - Earlier application deadline and earlier notification date for decision-making

- Rolling Admissions
  - Not a specific deadline listed (Ex: UCF, USF...)- get app in early though!
  - Make admissions decisions as they receive your application- can get decision quickly
  - The longer you wait, the less spots they will have

**CHART** 

- How does each school want my Transcript?
  - <u>SSAR (Self-reported Academic Report)</u> 8 of the 12 FL SUS schools use this
    - Request a current copy of your Transcript from Registrar- fafrank1@volusia.k12.fl.us- Type «Transcript» in subject line of email (Unofficial)
    - Be accurate- college will verify with Final Transcript
    - How to Video from FSU- currently updating from last year
    - Asks for Semester grades. For year long grades (ex-Alg 1, Geom, Bio)- enter final grade twice
    - List Senior classes as "In Progress"
    - Be sure to link SSAR to each college application (college will provide instructions on using your SSAR ID)
    - If you change a class senior year, you HAVE to update SSAR and/or contact college. Best NOT to change Senior year classes

- How does each school want my Transcript? (continued)
  - SPARK form (new at UCF only)- similar to SSAR
  - Sent by Registrar at SHS- Traditional way (FGCU, FIU- don't use SSAR)
    - Email Registrar with College name and she will send it- Fafrank1@volusia.k12.fl.us
      - Type «Transcript» in subject line of email
    - Official copy sent either Electronically or by Mail

**CHART** 

- How does each school want my SAT/ACT scores?
  - Most schools want them sent directly from College Board and/or ACT
    - Can request to send before take test during Registration process (4 schools free)
    - OR after take test, Log into your SAT/ACT account and select colleges
    - Fee applies (after window has passed)
  - Some schools will accept self-reported SAT/ACT scores and then verify them later (Be accurate when report) Example- FSU, UF
- Test dates and deadlines
- Check the latest test date can use for each college applying to

<u>CHART</u>

- Does school require a letter of Recommendation?
  - Give Recommender PLENTY of time (at least 2 weeks or more)
  - Choose someone who knows you well and can highlight your strengths
  - Provide a resume
  - Follow up if needed
- Does school require an Essay? Supplemental Writing Questions?

**CHART** 

- Do not assume that something is turned in- Double & Triple check that all parts of your Application have been submitted
  - It is YOUR responsibility to have a Completed Application
  - Letter of Rec not showing as turned in? FOLLOW UP with Teacher
  - Transcript not showing as submitted? FOLLOW UP with Registrar/check SSAR
  - School Report on Common App not showing as submitted? FOLLOW UP with Counselor
  - SAT/ACT scores not in? FOLLOW UP with Testing Agency

- Prepare a <u>Document/Resume</u> for yourself with Information that will be used often across applications so you have everything in one place
  - Activities: Volunteer work, jobs, clubs, sports, hobbies
    - Years of participation
    - Hours per week and weeks per year
    - Position/Leadership role held
    - Brief description of responsibilities
  - Academic Awards/Honors
    - Title of Award
    - When received it
    - Level of Recognition (State, Regional, National)

 Prepare an <u>Organizational Spreadsheet</u> to keep track of all dates and deadlines:

WHAT you need

HOW you need it

WHEN you need it

  - Given out last year at Junior College Night- updated for this school year
  - Chart will be available on AICE website- also emailed to you
  - Contains lots of useful information about college admissions

- 1- Gather materials
  - See Slide 21 (resume, activities, awards)
  - Get copy of your transcript
- 2- Create account and complete General "Common App" Tab
  - Show on sample student log-in
  - General Info is sent to all Colleges

- 3- Add Colleges
  - Shows any additional things individual colleges may need from you
- 4- Engage Supporters
  - Colleges need things like official school forms and/or letters of Recommendation
  - Need to invite people to submit things on your behalf
  - Make sure you invite the correct people- each college tells you what they require
  - School Report required for all colleges- Counselor has to complete- make sure to invite me as the counselor cmvillaf@volusia.k12.fl.us

- 5- Understand requirements
  - Keep track of what sections each college requires
  - Activities section is important!
    - Quality, not quantity- put your most meaningful activities first (Can list up to 10)
    - Be as detailed as possible (there is a word limit)
    - Include Leadership/Impact

- 6- Plan Essays
  - Mrs. Paul/Kepner
- 7- Submit Application
  - Each college submitted individually
  - Request fee waiver on Common App only if you have applied for and receive Free/Reduced Lunch at school- need to show F/R lunch letter
    - Located under Profile section

## Honors Colleges

- Within some colleges, you can apply separately to their Honors College
  - Worth your while!
  - Usually have some smaller classes
  - Special seminars
  - May have special housing options
  - Usually perk of registering for classes early
  - Special advisors
  - Check for requirements at different schools

# Honors Colleges

#### Example- UF

- 11,337 applicants to Honors College
- 1,508 admitted
- GPA: 4.6-4.7 (middle 50%)
- ACT: 34-35 (middle 50%)
- SAT: 1490-1550 (middle 50%)
- 2 additional essays to apply

#### Example- FSU

- GPA: 4.4-4.66 (middle 50%)
- ACT: 32-34 (middle 50%)
- SAT: 1440-1520 (middle 50%)
